Spotlight on **Microfibres**

One of the most pressing issues to planetary health, IWTO is increasingly asked about microfibres and wool's biodegradability.

Research is clear that natural fibres such as wool biodegrade in a relatively short period in warm, moist conditions.

Further, wool has been shown to biodegrade in marine environments.

Our Wool LCA TAG is currently evaluating information on the loss of natural fibres in the environment and we hope to have more to report on this subject soon.

Spotlight on **Test Certificates & Traceability**

Presentations at [the recent Wool Round Table](#) showed that wool growers are increasingly reporting on-farm practices, such as mulesing, in wool declarations.

Through certification processes in Australia and South Africa, this information is passed through the supply chain.

In Australia, where the declarations are voluntary, the average national rate is up to 65% and in some states higher.
